— is a non-governmental organization with over **10 years** of experience in implementing support programs for the population in eastern Ukraine, particularly in Donetsk, Luhansk, Kharkiv, Zaporizhzhia, and Dnipropetrovsk regions. Our work is focused on supporting internally displaced persons (IDPs) and local residents, with particular attention to community development and strengthening their resilience to today's challenges.

ABOUT THE NGO



HISTORY OF ESTABLISHMENT

The NGO "Responsible Citizens" was founded out of the need to organize fast and effective humanitarian assistance for residents of eastern Ukraine at the beginning of the war in 2014. Over several years, the volunteer initiative evolved into a professional civic organization. With the support of our international partners, over the 10 years of our existence we have implemented more than 56 projects, delivered tens of thousands of tons of humanitarian aid, traveled a cumulative distance comparable to two journeys around the world, and reached more than 1 million people with our assistance and support.

2014

On June 10, 2014, the "Responsible Citizens" team gathered for the first time in Donetsk to define the areas of their volunteer work, along with their principles and responsibilities. At the initial stage, it was a volunteer movement uniting people of different backgrounds and professions, all driven by a shared calling to help others in their native cities of Donetsk region. In the first months of our activity, our dedication was recognized by international humanitarian institutions and major Ukrainian foundations, with whom we launched an unprecedented support system for Ukrainians in the eastern regions of the country.

2015

We officially registered the NGO "Responsible Citizens." In doing so, we made a clear decision that helping people would become our profession and our core mission. We firmly believe that volunteering is a temporary response to crises, uniting many sincere and caring individuals. However, sustainable humanitarian work must be based on social responsibility toward the team and on transparent provision of social guarantees for all staff involved in such activities. This year, our team grew to 25 staff members and 7 crews, who delivered essential aid daily to high-risk areas.

2016 - 2019

The organization is scaling up, establishing new partnerships, and solidifying its status among international organizations such as the International Organization for Migration (IOM), Mercy Corps, Danish Demining Group, Triangle Génération Humanitaire, and others. We continue to implement humanitarian projects with a focus on psychosocial support and the development of youth initiatives through educational and cultural activities in communities of Donetsk and Luhansk regions.

2020 - Feb, 2022

In 2020, "Responsible Citizens" continued to provide psychosocial support to children from frontline communities in Donetsk and Luhansk regions. During the same period, the organization joined the civil union "Ukrainian Child Rights Network" to carry out joint advocacy for the protection of children's rights in Ukraine.

The beginning of the pandemic prompted the organization to focus on online educational projects. More than 2,000 teenagers and young people from Donetsk and Luhansk regions took part in informal online education courses. In addition, the organization joined efforts to support medical institutions and healthcare workers in responding to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Since 2022

Our activities expanded geographically and evolved contextually in response to the full-scale war that spread across the entire country. First and foremost, we built upon our 2014 experience in rapidly deploying humanitarian aid across various regions. The first months of the war were dedicated to responding to urgent humanitarian needs and carrying out evacuations, but in parallel, we immediately began developing community support projects in areas that faced an unprecedented influx of internally displaced people. Since 2022, we have expanded our operations to three more regions — Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Kharkiv.

This principle allows us to act without bias or external influence. The organization strives to create a safe environment for all participants, where every voice is heard and every need is taken into account. Neutrality enables us to work effectively with diverse communities and engage partners from various sectors.

02 NON-POLITICAL STANCE

We maintain a non-political status in order to focus on the humanitarian aspects of our work. Our goal is to help people regardless of their political beliefs, religion, or nationality. This approach allows us to concentrate on providing support to those in need and improving the lives of people in Ukraine without political pressure.

03 TRANSPARENCY

We are committed to the highest level of transparency in all our actions and financial operations. Our organization regularly reports on the results of its work, the use of resources, and the goals achieved. Transparency helps us build trust among our partners and the public by ensuring openness and accountability in all areas of our activity.

04 PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

We believe in the importance of openness to society — informing the public about our work and involving them in discussing key issues. Public engagement helps us foster active dialogue with different stakeholders, maintain interest in our projects, and attract new partners. Through transparency and communication, we aim to convey the significance of our mission and encourage participation in our efforts



Since October 3, 2023, this project has been implemented by the NGO "Responsible Citizens" with the support of UNICEF in Donetsk region. It covers the following territorial communities in Donetsk region: Pokrovsk, Myrnohrad, Dobropillia, Kryvyi Rih, Bilozerka, Novodonetske, Druzhkivka, Kostiantynivka, Kramatorsk, Sloviansk, Sviatohirsk, and Lyman.

In March 2024, the NGO "Responsible Citizens", with the support of Mercy Corps and the UK government, delivered family hygiene kits to **920 families** from Avdiivka and Ocheretyne who lost their property due to the war. The distribution was organized in humanitarian hubs in Novomoskovsk, Pavlohrad, Pershotravensk, Kamianske, and Mezhove, with the assistance of the Avdiivka Military Administration.

Since December 2023, the NGO "Responsible Citizens", with support from the international humanitarian organization World Vision, has been implementing this project in Donetsk region. The project focuses on assisting collective centers (temporary shelters) by providing: collective hygiene kits and fuel pellets for heating. Additionally, the following items were distributed: 270 individual kits (blanket + thermos), 250 heaters,100 portable gas stoves, each with 6 spare gas cartridges, 4,600 food kits, 600 hygiene kits, 3,600 liters of water.

In early January 2024, the NGO "Responsible Citizens" established the "Dobro na Amuri" shelter in Dnipro as part of the "Adaptive Rapid Humanitarian Response" project in partnership with World Vision International and with financial support from Aktion Deutschland Hilft (ADH).

The shelter has provided refuge for over 200 displaced persons from Donetsk, Kharkiv and **Luhansk regions** - families with children, people with disabilities, and elderly persons. The project enabled the procurement of essential items: beds, mattresses, a generator, lanterns, charging stations, bedding, blankets, a washing machine, and other necessities.

PARTNERSHIP IN SUPPORT



In November 2024, over **300 children in Donetsk region** received practical backpacks that will assist them not only in their studies but also in their daily lives! This support was made possible through collaboration with **Save the Children**.

The backpacks contain stationery and essential items for safety and convenience, including flashlights, thermal mugs, power banks, and reflective tape. These items will help children navigate the challenges of the energy crisis and support their education.

The distribution of backpacks took place in **Kramatorsk**, **Druzhkivka**, **Sloviansk**, **and Novodonetske communities of the Kramatorsk District**. Specialists from the NGO "Responsible Citizens" actively worked to deliver these packages directly to families in particular need of assistance.

TARGETED ASSISTANCE FOR THE ELDERLY CARE HOME IN DRUZHKIVKA, DONETSK REGION



The "Nadi Lang" care home opened in 2021, and since 2022, its residents and staff have faced ongoing tests of resilience, courage, and endurance.

In the first half of 2024, the care home primarily houses bedridden patients with serious illnesses. Among them are internally displaced persons and individuals from occupied territories who, for various reasons, cannot stay with their families or have been left in the care of the hospice by their relatives. Thanks to our **collaboration with Mercy Corps**, we were able to promptly meet the needs of the residents of the Druzhkivka Elderly Care Home by providing food and hygiene products, including a three-month supply of adult diapers.

"For all the years of the war, this is the first time I've received help,"

shared 63-year-old Nataliia Mykolaivna from Kehychivka in Kharkiv region.

When the full-scale invasion began, Nataliia and her family decided to stay in their home. Leaving the place where they had spent their entire lives was not only difficult but also complicated by personal challenges. Nataliia's health has deteriorated, making it hard for her to move even within her home. She now faces daily household struggles alongside her 33-year-old son, who lost a leg due to a serious illness and has a disability.

"So, where could we go when both of us can barely get around? Here in Kehychivka, we have friends, neighbors—everyone feels like family now. I worked in trade my whole life, always interacting with people. Over the years of the war, we've grown closer than relatives with many here. We stick together and help each other," Nataliia Mykolaivna said.

She learned about our cash assistance program almost by chance. A caring friend sent her a link to register.

"I had no experience with such things and wasn't particularly trusting. But one sleepless night, I decided to figure it out, answered the questions in the form, and sent it off. A few days later, I got a call saying we'd been accepted into the program. I still can't believe it! This is truly the first time we've received such help in all the years of the war," Nataliia Mykolaivna shared.

The financial support came at a critical time for Nataliia's family. They were able to purchase expensive medications, preventive drugs, immune-boosting supplements, and essential nutritious food.

"I'd really love to do something for my grandson. We're hoping to save a little to get him something useful as a gift when the opportunity arises," Nataliia Mykolaivna added.

says Yulia.

When Yulia learned she was pregnant, her heart filled with joy. It was a long-awaited moment she had dreamed of for years. But just a few days later, she was diagnosed with cancer. It felt like life was playing a cruel game with her.

I stood in front of the mirror, looking at myself. How could everything change so quickly? One moment, you're a happy expectant mother, and the next, a patient in an oncology ward. It was terrifying. I didn't know what to do or where to turn," — Yulia confesses, recalling that moment.

Treatment was urgent, and time was against her. Yet every time she thought of her unborn child, she found the strength to fight. However, the cost of treatment, including expensive medications, was beyond her family's means. A single vial of medicine cost UAH 80,000 — a sum they couldn't raise on their own.

Yulia shares:

"When we realized we couldn't cope alone, we had to ask for help. It was hard to ask for money, but when it's about your child's life and your own, pride takes a backseat."

Yulia and her husband sought help everywhere, and fate led them to the NGO "Responsible Citizens," which, in partnership with World Vision Ukraine Crisis Response, was implementing a large-scale project. Thanks to support from the USAID Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA), Acted Ukraine, and the Ukrainian Response Consortium, they were able to register for cash assistance. The funds arrived quickly, enabling Yulia to start treatment on time.

"This was a miracle. Every time we received help, I felt an invisible hand supporting us. It wasn't just financial aid—it was true support for life", says Yulia.

Yulia gave birth in the spring and continues her treatment abroad.

Since July 2023, the NGO "Responsible Citizens", in collaboration with the **United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)**, has implemented a project aimed at providing psychosocial, educational, and medical support to families with children in Kharkiv, Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, and Zaporizhzhia regions.

The project delivered targeted services to children and their families while strengthening cooperation between local authorities, social protection agencies, educational institutions, and humanitarian organizations. This fosters a sustainable infrastructure to protect and support the most vulnerable populations.



"This project was a true challenge for us, but also a significant opportunity to contribute to the future of communities. We are proud of the results achieved together with UNICEF and believe that the foundations laid will support the development of communities in vulnerable eastern regions even after the program's completion," said Olha Kosse, Head of the Board of the NGO "Responsible Citizens."

As part of the comprehensive project with UNICEF, **48 child-friendly spaces** were established across four regions of Ukraine. In these child-friendly spaces, internally displaced families and local residents can access free, integrated services from social workers and lawyers. Children receive support from psychologists, speech therapists, and art therapists, and weekly thematic events are organized. Comprehensive psychological support is available to all families with children in need.

REAL STORIES, REAL CHANGE



"Children are curious about everything right now! They've missed socializing, friends, and exciting games so much—in short, everything that comes with a normal, peaceful childhood. So, we're doing everything we can to organize their time in a way that lets them feel at least a piece of that childhood, even in these conditions,"

shares art therapist Alona.

"For me, it's important to bring joy back into children's eyes. You know, we often use fairy tale therapy," Alona explains. "Together with the children, we invent heroes, create storylines, and draw entire worlds. It's a hundred percent successful practice that works for any age! When I see children believing in their heroes and their own strengths, I know my work truly matters."



"We named our son Myroslav because we believed that by the time he was born, there would be peace. He's now 1.4 years old. My older daughter, Oleksandra, is 5. My husband and I decided not to stay in Kharkiv so our children wouldn't have to live under constant shelling,",

says Kateryna Leptova.

"We left Kharkiv in a hurry in February 2022, taking only documents, computer equipment, and children's belongings. We decided to go to Berestyn to my husband's parents."

Change began when Kateryna, by chance, met Alona, a psychologist from the NGO "Responsible Citizens," at a playground. Alona told her about a child-friendly space in the city where families could seek help.

"I was so happy about this! It's an opportunity for the kids because everything around is either closed or costs money. In the child-friendly space, there are professional educators who offer age-appropriate development programs, new toys, and, most importantly, socializing. They also offered me sessions with a psychologist to help ease my state of mind. Talking it out was something I really needed. Step by step, we started to find our way out of this corner," Kateryna says.

Through the child-friendly space, the family also received special vouchers for children's clothing. This is part of the assistance from international partners, enabling affected families to purchase warm clothes for their children. Kateryna's older daughter, Oleksandra, has fallen in love with drawing, and all summer, she's been learning to rollerblade with her new friends.

Child-friendly spaces have become a favorite place for family celebrations.



"Every visit from them was an event for us. We all felt that they were genuinely invested in our well-being. The children received psychological support, which was incredibly important to me because they were noticeably anxious about our situation. My younger son was given a backpack with safety items—he comes home late from sports practice, and this really put us at ease. I was also amazed by how much useful information they provided. Thanks to the specialists' advice, I was able to find some extra work. They also helped us apply for winter financial assistance," says Olga's family from Sloviansk, Donetsk region.



Ivanna, a mother of two daughters—10-year-old Milana and 2-year-old Nadiyka—was forced to leave her hometown of Myrnohrad with her family due to daily shelling. In March 2024, they relocated to the safer Novodonetska community.

The move was a difficult ordeal.

"We lost everything that was dear and familiar. But my biggest concern was for the children—how they would cope with this stress," Ivanna shares.

At first, Milana found solace in the child-friendly space, which helped her adapt to the new community.

"My daughter couldn't wait to go to the activities every day. That place was an island of calm and joy for her," Ivanna says.

However, due to a worsening security situation, group activities in the space were suspended.

"That was a tough moment for us, but thankfully, we continued to receive individual consultations with a psychologist, which helped both Milana and me immensely," she adds.

WORK OF MOBILE TEAMS IN EASTERN UKRAINE

Project

implemented by the NGO "Responsible Citizens" in partnership with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), brings together specialists who visit families daily to provide essential support.

Tetyana, a former nurse, worked through the entire COVID-19 pandemic in what she calls "combat conditions." After a recommendation from her hospital supervisor, who recognized her potential, she decided to pursue psychology. She enrolled at the Interregional Academy of Personnel Management (MAUP) and now applies her knowledge in daily practice.



"This is my first time working with a humanitarian organization and in my new profession. It's truly invaluable experience and opportunity. There are challenges, of course, but every day I'm convinced that people's ability to overcome difficulties is boundless. Sometimes, all it takes is sincere and professional support from someone who's there at the right moment," Tetyana shares.

She says she's already had her first powerful moments in practical work. "It happened recently when I received a simple text message from a woman I've been working with: 'Tanechka, thank you for your support! My son is alive and got in touch from the hospital.' This woman had been waiting for contact with her child for 74 long days, and in recent weeks, we were by her side to help her cope with her state," says the psychologist from our mobile team.



«"The purpose of my life was to train future social workers to perform their jobs at the highest level. But the scale of the current tragedy is so immense that it demands all hands on deck in practical work", says Marianna, a Kharkiv resident.

Since the start of the invasion, Marianna, a mother of three, has not left her hometown. In addition to teaching at the Kharkiv Humanitarian-Pedagogical Academy, she began helping people directly through humanitarian organizations and joined the "Responsible Citizens" team this year.

She says she is most inspired by the resilience of people who grow stronger despite dire circumstances.

"I worked with a mother of three who has a disability. She fled occupation, and her husband's fate remains unknown—he's missing. She has three lively and bright boys. The younger twins are nearly 4 years old, and they need interaction with peers. The family is very close-knit, and you can see how much the children benefit from the environment and activities with specialists. The mother is a true example of a woman's strength and courage, raising remarkable individuals. Stories like these are truly inspiring."

WORK OF MOBILE TEAMS IN EASTERN UKRAINE

Natalia lives and works in her hometown of Kryvyi Rih. Before 2014, she was a psychologist and kindergarten teacher. Since the start of the war, she has been a volunteer, meeting the first internally displaced persons from eastern Ukraine and providing them with initial assistance.



"We did what we could in that situation—making sure everyone was fed, clothed, and had a roof over their heads. Later, various humanitarian programs joined in, we teamed up with volunteers, and raised funds. We've gone through the entire journey of humanitarian work through tough, hands-on experience," says Natalia.

For over a year, Natalia has been applying her experience as part of a mobile team with the NGO "Responsible Citizens." She shares that they encounter very challenging cases—families with more than 10 children with special needs or households living in half-destroyed homes, having lost hope.

"The country is now engulfed in such human tragedies, and unfortunately, the number of people in need grows every day. But we try to focus on the changes we see in families over time—on the spark in children's eyes when we arrive, on the gratitude of parents who sometimes just need genuine human support to lean on," Natalia shares.

She is a mother of three herself. Her youngest son, born at the start of the war, is now 11 years old. Her middle daughter is finishing 11th grade and has never known peaceful school years. Natalia's eldest daughter, 26, works alongside her mother in the mobile team of "Responsible Citizens." She graduated with a master's degree in social work, inspired by her mother's dedicated example, which guided her choice of a lifelong career.

Both Natalia and her eldest daughter are wives of servicemen. All the men in their family have been defending the country since 2014.

"When this war ends, I really want to gather our entire family and see the sea," Natalia says.

PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT FOR SOCIAL WORKERS AND EDUCATORS

As part of the comprehensive project in partnership with UNICEF, training sessions were organized on the topic: "Meeting Individual Needs: From Ensuring Safety to Conflict Prevention".

These training events brought together educators, social service workers, psychologists, and specialists from non-governmental organizations in Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Kharkiv regions. Participants learned effective techniques and practices to identify children's needs, support their fulfillment, and prevent conflicts in school and family environments.

The trainers impressed us with their professionalism — they turned theory into practical tools that we are already successfully using with students. This knowledge is invaluable. After the training, my colleagues and I noticed real changes in our communication with children. This became possible thanks to the support of initiatives like ours."

MINE SAFETY



In 2024, the NGO "Responsible Citizens" continued implementing regular mine safety programs in the Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Kharkiv, and Zaporizhzhia regions. These activities were carried out based in Child-Friendly Spaces, in partnership with UNICEF, the State Emergency Service of Ukraine, and other international organizations. Our initiatives focus on fostering a culture of safety among children and their families by providing consistent access to life-saving education and materials in mine-contaminated areas.

ACTIVITIES IN 2024:

- The first public readings of the comic series "Patron the Dog and His Adventures" (5 issues) were held at Child-Friendly Spaces for Mine Awareness Day on April 4. The events engaged children aged 4 to 12 and reached over 10,000 participants across four regions in eastern Ukraine.
- For older children (13+), interactive sessions using virtual reality (VR) were organized. The VR experience, created by UNICEF, EPAM volunteers, the IT Association of Ukraine, and videographer Evgeniy Maloletka, and made available through Oculus II headsets provided by McPaw, reached 300 teenagers. The program demonstrated safe behavior in mined areas of Donetsk region.
- Ongoing access to educational mine safety materials was ensured at Child-Friendly Spaces, including comics, brochures, and interactive resources regularly used by children, parents, and educators.
- "Promoting a culture of safety—especially through educational activities for children—is a key part of our work. Knowledge about mine risks must become a habit that saves lives. We are working to ensure our Spaces serve as safety hubs for communities in eastern Ukraine," said Olha Kosse, Head of the Board of the NGO "Responsible Citizens".

EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS

In 2024, the NGO "Responsible Citizens" continued to prioritize its work in the field of education, recognizing the critical role it plays in building resilient communities and addressing the challenges brought by war. These initiatives aim to meet the complex educational needs of students and adults in war-affected regions of Ukraine, with a focus on skill development, career building, and compensating for the educational losses experienced by children due to the conflict.

SOFT AND BUSINESS SKILLS

To strengthen individuals' capacity to navigate today's challenges, we offered comprehensive training programs in soft and business skills. These workshops covered a wide range of topics, including effective communication, teamwork, financial literacy, and entrepreneurship. Our soft skills training included modules on:

- Effective communication
- 73 Teamwork and collaboration
- Problem-solving and critical thinking
- P Emotional intelligence and resilience

Business skills training focused on: basics of accounting and financial management, marketing and sales techniques, business planning and entrepreneurial skills.

These competencies are essential for helping people adapt to changing conditions and contribute meaningfully to their communities, especially during wartime.

OD CAREER GUIDANCE AND CAREER BUILDING

Recognizing the importance of vocational training and career development, we provided diverse programs aimed at improving job readiness and employment opportunities.

- **Reskilling courses in modern professions:** We offered practical courses in in-demand areas such as accounting, social media marketing (SMM), and digital literacy.
- **English language courses:** Understanding the global importance of English, children and adults improved their English proficiency. This initiative not only enhances their communication skills but also opens doors to international collaboration and career opportunities.

Through these programs, we help community members adapt to the shifting economic landscape and pursue fulfilling, sustainable careers — a vital support in the context of war.

EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS

COMPENSATING FOR EDUCATION LOSSES DUE TO WAR

The war has severely disrupted the educational journeys of many children. To address this issue, we implemented programs aimed at helping children recover lost learning. Through specialized supplementary classes, children received the support they needed to compensate for the educational gaps caused by the conflict. Our approach combines traditional in-person classes with innovative online platforms to ensure accessibility and continuity of learning.

We placed particular focus on children with special educational needs, offering them tailored support in collaboration with subject teachers and speech therapists. This innovative methodology is now being systematized and shared as a practical resource for educational institutions.


SOFT AND BUSINESS SKILLS: "LIVES 3.0" PROJECT TO SUPPORT COMMUNITIES

CAREER GUIDANCE AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In 2024, the NGO "Responsible Citizens" implemented career guidance and career development projects in Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Kharkiv regions, in cooperation with international partners World Vision and Mercy Corps.

These initiatives are aimed at supporting people who lost their jobs or need new skills due to the war, through three key programs:

- O1 Educational projects for children, youth, and women "Building the Future" in partnership with World Vision
- Project "Local, Inclusive, and Multisectoral Emergency Support for People Affected by the War in Ukraine (LIVES) 3.0" in partnership with Mercy Corps
- Project "Strengthening the Capacity of Communities in Eastern Ukraine through Humanitarian, Psychological, and Career Support Programs" in partnership with Mercy Corps

KEY ACTIVITIES AND RESULTS (2024):

The projects reached communities through:

- 3-month English language courses at an international school
- Retraining courses in various fields (accounting, computer literacy, SMM, etc.)
- Career guidance trainings and funding of new professional courses for the unemployed



BRIDGING THE EDUCATION GAP CAUSED BY WAR: "STRENGTHENING THE RESILIENCE OF THE EDUCATION SYSTEM IN EASTERN UKRAINE"

In 2024, the NGO Responsible Citizens, with the support of the Ministry of Justice of Ukraine and the Government of the Faroe Islands, implemented the project "Strengthening the Resilience of the Education System in Eastern Ukraine" in the Kryvyi Rih and Marhanets communities of Dnipropetrovsk region. This initiative aimed to support children aged 6 to 17 who lost access to quality education due to the war, while also enhancing the capacity of teachers to work in humanitarian settings.

KEY RESULTS (2024):



unique children participated in over **1,400 offline** and online classes (6 students per group, 20 sessions per group) designed to help compensate for learning loss.



teachers and educators completed training sessions to gain skills in delivering education in crisis contexts.



The sessions featured innovative methods such as inclusive classrooms with subject teachers and speech therapists, as well as exam preparation and guidance for university entrance.

FROM KNOWLEDGE TO INDEPENDENCE: CAPACITY BUILDING THROUGH COLLABORATION WITH EMPLOYMENT CENTERS

In 2024, the NGO Responsible Citizens, within the framework of the project "Strengthening the Capacity of Communities in Eastern Ukraine Through Humanitarian, Psychological, and Career Support Programs" (supported by the international humanitarian organization Mercy Corps since November 2023), continued its strategic work on enhancing the qualifications of employment center specialists.

This initiative is a key component of our comprehensive approach to supporting people affected by the war. It goes beyond training in soft, business, and career skills—it creates real pathways to employment and economic self-sufficiency.



"We believe that education is just the first step. For people to earn a living from the knowledge they gain and achieve financial stability, it is crucial to integrate educational programs with the work of employment centers. These institutions help individuals find jobs, adapt to the labor market, and build careers. This cooperation enables systemic solutions for communities in Eastern Ukraine, which have suffered significant economic and social losses due to the war", — Enrique Menendez, Director of Programs and Projects at Responsible Citizens.

KEY RESULTS (2024):



Three training sessions were held for **81 employment center** specialists in each of the four regions—Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Kharkiv—reaching a total of **324 participants.** These trainings were designed to improve their ability to support unemployed individuals and internally displaced persons (IDPs).



The trainings covered topics such as career counseling, labor market adaptation, and the integration of educational programs into employment center activities, thereby contributing to the creation of sustainable career opportunities for participants in our programs.



This work highlights our commitment to a holistic approach that combines education, support, and employment—empowering people not only to learn but also to apply their potential in a new reality.

OI PARTICIPATION IN THE 68TH SESSION OF THE UN COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN, MARCH 2024



On March 14, 2024, Olha Kosse, Head of the Board of the NGO "Responsible Citizens", participated in the 68th session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York. This annual UN event, focused on gender equality and the empowerment of women, brought together representatives from 58 countries affected by armed conflicts to engage in open dialogue.

The session served as a platform for advocating for the protection of women's rights in conflict zones, particularly in Ukraine.

As a result, a Peace Action Roadmap and a joint resolution were developed and submitted to the UN Secretary-General, emphasizing the importance of gender equality as a foundation for sustainable peace.

This engagement strengthened the international standing of Responsible Citizens and highlighted the organization's contribution to global humanitarian initiatives for women and war-affected communities.

JOINT APPEAL OF 46 CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS TO THE PRESIDENT OF UKRAINE, APRIL 2024

In April 2024, Responsible Citizens joined 46 civil society organizations and charitable foundations in addressing an appeal to President Volodymyr Zelenskyy. The appeal called for enhanced protection of the rights of internally displaced persons (IDPs) and war-affected communities. The statement urged the development of a national strategy to support people who have lost their homes due to the war, ensuring their access to humanitarian aid, education, and economic support.

This initiative received wide public resonance and encouraged engagement from national authorities in addressing the critical needs of displaced and affected populations.

OLENA BIELOLIPTSEVA JOINS THE COORDINATION COUNCIL AT THE KHARKIV REGIONAL MILITARY ADMINISTRATION, MAY 2024



In May 2024, Olena Bieloliptseva, Education Programs Coordinator at Responsible Citizens, joined the Coordination Council at the Kharkiv Regional Military Administration. This appointment enabled the organization to influence the development of regional education policies aimed at supporting children and educators in Kharkiv region. Olena presented strategies for compensating education losses caused by the war, integrating modern technologies, and providing psychosocial support to teachers. This advocacy milestone further emphasized the leadership role of Responsible Citizens in shaping sustainable educational systems across communities in Eastern Ukraine.

OOORDINATING THE CHILD PROTECTION SUB-CLUSTER IN KHARKIV REGION, AUGUST 2024



Together with the NGO Coordination Humanitarian Center, we coordinate the work of the Child Protection Sub-Cluster in Kharkiv region. This includes organizing monthly partner meetings to exchange experiences and align actions. We respond to community requests, ensure the protection of children's rights, and report to the National Cluster on regional humanitarian responses, including the evacuation of children from frontline areas and the operation of the transit center in Kharkiv.

We have developed tools to collect data on the activities of partner organizations. All stakeholders working in child protection are actively engaged to foster joint efforts and ensure that the best interests of the child are upheld.

OS DISCUSSION ON THE CHILD RIGHTS PROTECTION STRATEGY, AUGUST 2024



Alla Maslakhova, Regional Coordinator of Responsible Citizens in Dnipropetrovsk region, participated in an interagency meeting dedicated to the implementation of the Strategy for Ensuring Every Child's Right to Grow Up in a Family Environment for 2024–2028.

The meeting, convened by the Dnipropetrovsk Regional Military Administration, brought together leading humanitarian experts and community representatives to update priorities in the field of child protection and accelerate the search for effective solutions.

"For our organization, regional cooperation between different actors is of utmost importance. It not only allows us to consolidate efforts in protecting children's rights but also enables more effective support for families, helping create conditions conducive to child development and care," said Alla Maslakhova, Regional Coordinator.

OS PARTICIPATION IN THE NATIONAL YOUTH FORUM, AUGUST 2024



To mark Youth Day, the NGO Responsible Citizens took part in the National Youth Forum held in Kyiv. For three days, youth leaders and activists from civil society organizations across the country gathered to unite efforts and articulate a shared vision for the future of Ukraine. The forum became an important platform for exchanging experiences and ideas focused on shaping Ukraine's youth policy. As participants, we contributed to the development of a new national youth policy and actively engaged in drafting the Concept of the State Target Program "Youth of Ukraine" for 2026–2030.

This program will serve as a strategic document defining the priorities of youth policy for the coming decade. A key element of the forum was the support provided by our partners — UNICEF Ukraine and UKaid — who expressed their commitment to youth-led initiatives and shared their experience in youth movement development in other post-conflict regions.

From our side, Responsible Citizens brought valuable expertise in supporting youth through a series of educational projects implemented in cooperation with Mercy Corps and World Vision International. These projects have opened new learning and upskilling opportunities for thousands of young people from eastern Ukraine.

OT MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS INITIATIVES, OCTOBER 2024



In October 2024, Olha Kosse, Head of the Board of NGO "Responsible Citizens", joined the events dedicated to World Mental Health Day, held in Kyiv under the patronage of Ukraine's First Lady, Olena Zelenska.

The events aimed to raise awareness about mental health issues and promote the development of support programs for various population groups. Our organization's participation in these initiatives reflects its active stance on mental health advocacy and its collaboration with national programs aimed at improving the psychosocial well-being of Ukrainian citizens.

VIENNA MEETING BETWEEN UKRAINIAN CIVIL SOCIETY REPRESENTATIVES AND AUSTRIAN FOREIGN MINISTER ALEXANDER SCHALLENBERG, OCTOBER 2024



The international community continues to play a significant role in strengthening civil society organizations in Ukraine that are addressing critically important areas of support for people affected by war. At present, the Austrian government is funding a number of humanitarian programs and emphasizes the priority of development-oriented projects for people in Ukraine.

These issues of support and long-term recovery were the focus of a high-level meeting between Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs Alexander Schallenberg and representatives of 20 leading Ukrainian civil society organizations. Head of the Board of the NGO "Responsible Citizens", Olha Kosse, was invited to participate in this important dialogue.



"We are at a complex stage where we must respond quickly and effectively to urgent challenges while simultaneously laying the foundation for Ukraine's post-war recovery. This situation demands a high level of analysis and the ability to adapt to changes in society that are happening faster than ever before," — — stated Olha Kosse, Head of the Board of Responsible Citizens

The meeting was held as part of the Civil Society Leadership Program Ukraine (CLPU), implemented by the NGO Academy. This program was established in 2013 to strengthen civil society in Central and Eastern Europe.

BRIDGE FORUM 2024: NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR COOPERATION AND CIVIL SOCIETY DEVELOPMENT



The BRIDGE Forum 2024, held in Dnipro, became a key event for discussing the challenges and prospects of the civil society sector in eastern Ukraine. The event brought together around 250 participants, including representatives of NGOs, local authorities, and international partners, creating a unique platform for knowledge exchange and building partnerships.

Alla Maslakhova, Regional Project Coordinator at the NGO "Responsible Citizens," took an active part in the event.

The forum served as a bridge for communication, where participants discussed the urgent needs of communities in the eastern regions, shared challenges in their work, and identified joint solutions.

The event was organized by Acted, UKaid, and the Relief Coordination Centre.

RESPONSIBLE CITIZENS NGO INITIATED THE CREATION OF AN EXPERT EDUCATIONAL WORKING GROUP (DECEMBER)



The goal behind the establishment of the expert working group by the NGO "Responsible Citizens" was to develop innovative solutions to address the critical challenges facing Ukrainian education due to three years of war, the pandemic, and ongoing economic hardships. The group brings together leading experts to produce methodological recommendations aimed at helping more than 200,000 children recover from learning losses—particularly in eastern regions most severely affected by the war.

Its work focuses on adapting learning for children with special educational needs, providing psycho-emotional support for teachers, developing soft skills, and fostering meaningful collaboration with parents. This comprehensive and modern approach unites sector leaders with many years of experience.

Through this initiative, Responsible Citizens positions itself as an innovative leader shaping a new era of Ukrainian education—one rooted in resilience and progress.
